A Strong Foundation: Critical to Families and the Future of The Arc's Work

"The Arc? What's that?' It amazes me now that I was asking those questions just a few years ago," reflects Carol Wheeler as she thinks about the changes in her life since she first met Peter Berns. The Arc's CEO. The two met while serving on the Obama Administration's President's Committee for People with Intellectual Disabilities. Carol and her husband Tom are parents to 33-year-old Max, who has Williams syndrome, a type intellectual/developmental disability (IDD).



Max's family has been all in from the beginning when it comes to making sure Max has the supports and opportunities he needs and deserves. But it

was only when Carol became connected with the President's Committee – and The Arc – that the Wheelers took a deep dive into disability advocacy.

I learned quickly that so many families face challenges much greater than ours.

Having adopted Max as a baby, Carol and Tom traveled through the full journey typical of millions of families that include someone with IDD. The Arc supports these individuals and their families across the lifespan, helping them navigate the highs and lows that can begin with early medical challenges and special education programs and that carry on through the decades as their adult children look for jobs, supportive housing, and meaningful social connections.

"With 600+ chapters and a staff in Washington known for its expertise and track record of success in shaping government policy, it's the organization best positioned to make a real impact," she says.

Carol has supported this critical work through her service on the national board of The Arc and currently, through her position with the board of her local chapter, The Arc of DC. She recently agreed to lead the reactivation of The Foundation of The Arc of the United States because she feels the urgency of finding additional resources to fuel the work that still needs to be done. "The Arc has a long history of significant legislative and policy achievement.

Making Gifts to a Supporting Organization

Many donors are aware of the difference between Public Charities (supported mainly by the broader public) and Private Foundations (usually funded by one family). Less well known are a third type of charitable organization: Supporting Organizations. These are charitable organizations established to help provide ongoing funding and support to a specific public charity. By way of example, The Arc of the United States ("The Arc"), has a supporting organization, The Arc of the United States Foundation ("The Foundation"). The Foundation's sole purpose is to support The Arc as a whole and many of its specific charitable activities.



Supporting organizations must meet certain standards set by Congress and the IRS in order to qualify as a supporting organization. These standards are in place to ensure that the supported organization is effectively supervising or paying particular attention to the operations of the supporting organization. In the case of The Foundation, it is deemed a Type I supporting organization, meaning that it is operated, supervised, or controlled by the supported organization, The Arc.

The relationship between a supported organization and a supporting organization provides critical, ongoing funding for

the supported organization's programs. Programmatic activities of the supported organization are positively impacted by the supporting organization, as the latter designates, often permanently, the programs it will support.

securities remain deductible for up to 30% of a taxpayer's AGI

Supporting Organizations are separate legal entities from the supported organizations, and therefore have a separate board of directors from that of the supported organization. The Supporting Organization's board can therefore set its own spending priorities, and through them help influence the direction of the supported organization.

From a tax perspective, gifts to supporting organizations are deductible to the same extent as gifts made to public charities. The CARES Act has increased the amount deductible to 100% of Adjusted Gross Income ("AGI") for cash contributions,

which will remain in effect for 2021. Gifts of appreciated securities remain deductible for up to 30% of a taxpayer's AGI.

disability services available to everyone who needs them to live at home in their communities with their friends and family instead of institutions and nursing homes, and services would be portable from state-to-state.
